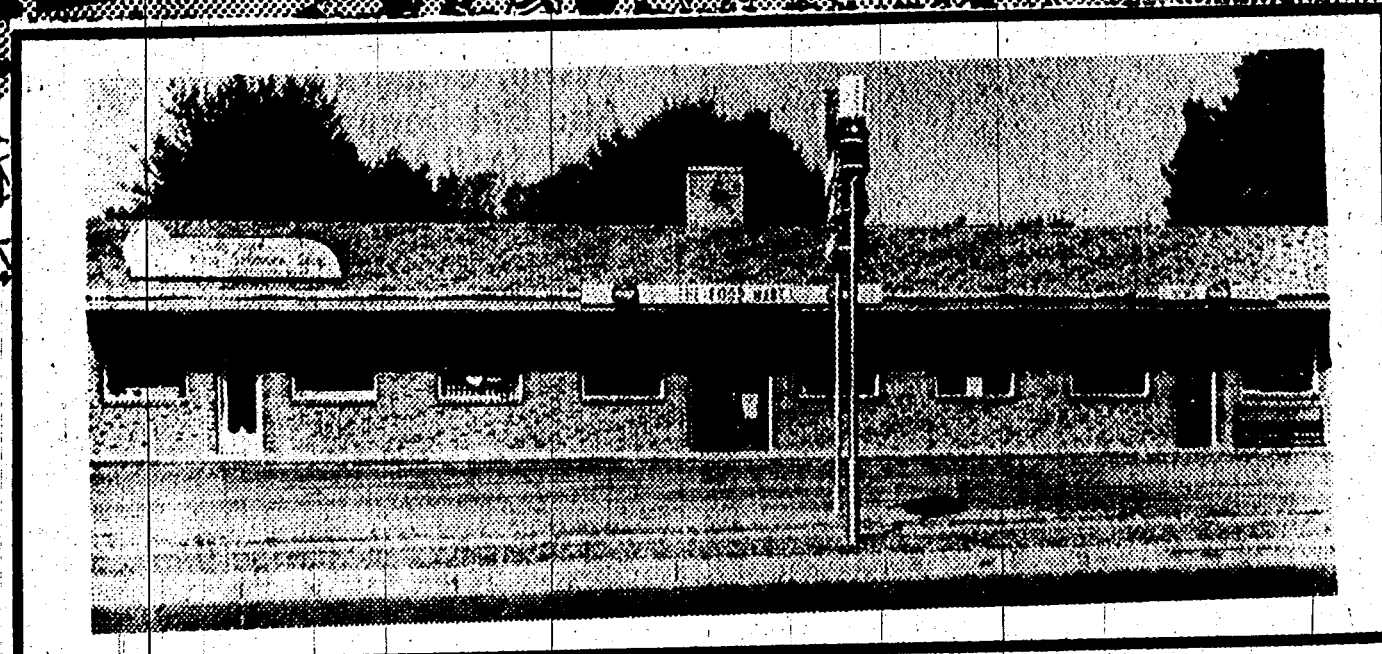

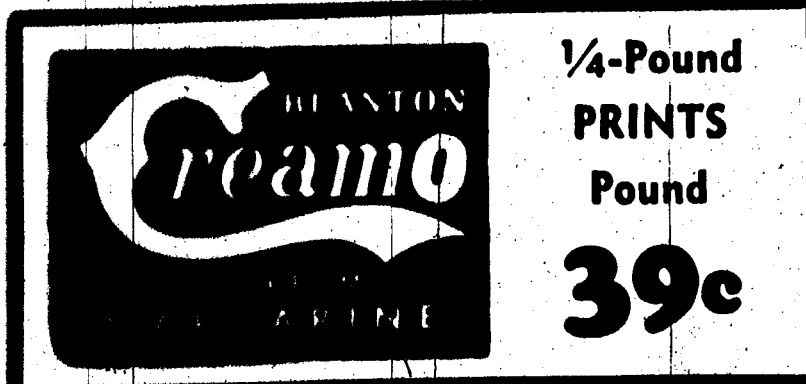

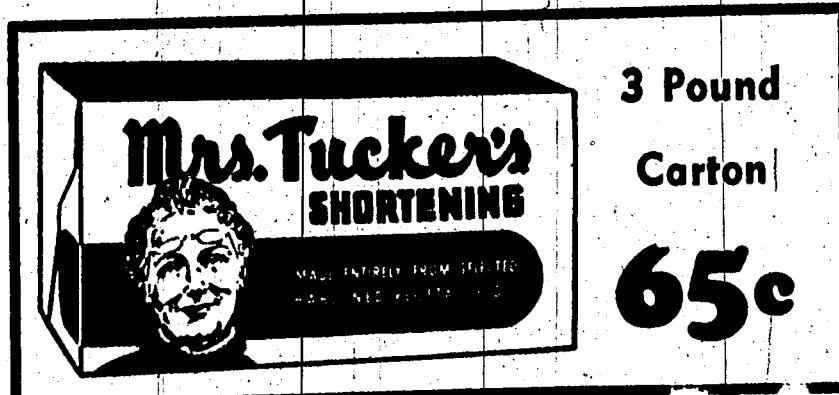

### Cool Weather Brings Showers

A few gold and red leaves was about all that remained for Mother Nature to produce today as proof that Autumn was at hand.

Cool weather out of the north sent a few advance breezes ahead Wednesday night, followed by cloudy skies, light showers, and temperatures that almost suggested football.

The immediate Marshall area missed the heavy storms which the cool weather produced at Texarkana and Shreveport. Here one tenth of an inch of rain fell early Thursday afternoon, and another .26 inch fell early Friday.

The temperature, which hit a high of 83 Thursday, saw a low of 68 last night. At 8:30 o'clock this morning it had climbed one degree above the night's low.

September rainfall to date climbed to 1.20 inches, only 1.04 inches below the month's normal of 2.24 inches.

Rainfall for the year to date totals 40.67 inches, a surplus of 6.83 inches more than the normal 33.84 inches of the first nine months.

### Two Farm Bureau Further Improvement Seen in Job Picture

A series of 25 bi-district meetings sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation will be held throughout the state in September. It has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, federation president.

The two meetings scheduled for this district will be held in the Court House at Longview, Sept. 17 and in the County Court Room, at Clarksville, on Sept. 19. Director D. L. Fugler of Marshall will preside. Meetings will start at 10 o'clock.

Marvin Carter, organization director of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, will conduct the meetings. M. C. Jaynes, specialist in organization and cooperative marketing, Extension Service, and R. G. Arnold, organization director, Southern Region, American Farm Bureau Federation, will also appear on the program.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Further improvement in the unemployment picture is expected this month. This would reinforce August's 400,000 decline in the number of jobless men and women.

Officials predicted also that the July setback in industrial production will be wiped out completely when the Federal Reserve Board issues its August index.

Government economists were cautiously optimistic in appraising Thursday's report of the Census Bureau. It showed that civilian employment rose to 59,947,000 last month.

That was tops for 1949, although almost 1,300,000 below the record total of a year ago.

The tally of jobless meantime dropped to 3,659,000, as mills, mines, stores and business houses absorbed workers. In July unemployment was 4,095,000, highest since 1942.

One highly placed economist said the significance of this showing "should not be exaggerated, but we have certainly pulled away from the downward spiral" which has prevailed since last fall.

Democratic and Republican spokesmen in the Senate disagreed with each other. Sen. Lucas (D-MI) the majority leader, proclaimed there is "now no reason to fear a further recession." The GOP floor leader, Sen. Wherry (Neb), felt that the 400,000 drop in unemployment was "too small to be regarded as a reliable index."

Sheriff Henry F. Becker of Niagara County swore in the special deputies Thursday night. He had called for volunteers after 14 persons were injured in fighting.



### Jesus Quoted From the Psalms

The Golden Text: "Seek ye Jehovah and His Strength; Seek ye His face evermore."—Psalm 105:4.

Scripture—Psalms 8:2; 22:1, 16-18; 91:1-2; 103:1-2; 119:118-22; Matt. 21:15-16, 38-42; 22:41-45; Luke 24:46.

By NEWMAN CAMPBELL. HOW MANY millions of people in the world rely upon the Bible as a source of strength in their problems and griefs? That is one reason we are given these lessons from the Psalms. They are not only beautiful as literature, but the words we read now in Sunday school will come back in some of our dark hours and comfort us.

Also, in our joyous hours, when we are contemplating the glories of nature, we will quote from the Psalms: "How marvelous are Thy words through all the earth!" And again, "The heavens declare the glory of the Lord, and the firmament sheweth His handiwork." Jesus knew the scriptures by heart. He amazed the high priests by His knowledge of the law, and they were often amazed when He said to them, "Read ye not in the scriptures?" quoting to them—who were supposed to be experts on Hebrew law—what was so familiar to Him.

Today's lesson shows how the Lord Jesus quoted Psalms in His teachings to the people, and how He relied on them—drawing strength from the words of the prophets and seers of old.

When Jesus rode in triumph to Jerusalem, the children in the temple shouted "Hosannas to the son of David," which annoyed the elders of the church. They said to Him, "Hosanna? Thou what? These are saying?" Jesus answered them from Psalm 8:2, "Yes, He said, did ye never read, out of the mouth of babes and sucklings hast thou perfected praise?"

Jesus, always presented, Jehovah to the people as a just but loving father. From Psalm 103:8 we quote: "Jehovah is merciful and gracious. Slow to anger, and abundant in loving kindness. He will not always chide; neither will He keep His anger forever. He hath not dealt with us after our sins, nor rewarded us after our iniquities, for as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is His loving kindness toward them that fear Him."

Certainly, the Truman experiment will fail unless labor leaders have a change of attitude. They can set fires faster than any fire department can extinguish them.  
All the above means that there is no hurry to buy stocks or bonds. The Truman experiment must ultimately result in higher taxes. This leaves less money for people to invest. The real difficulty with the stock market today is not because of the dividends nor the security, but because investors have no money left to invest after paying living expenses and taxes. 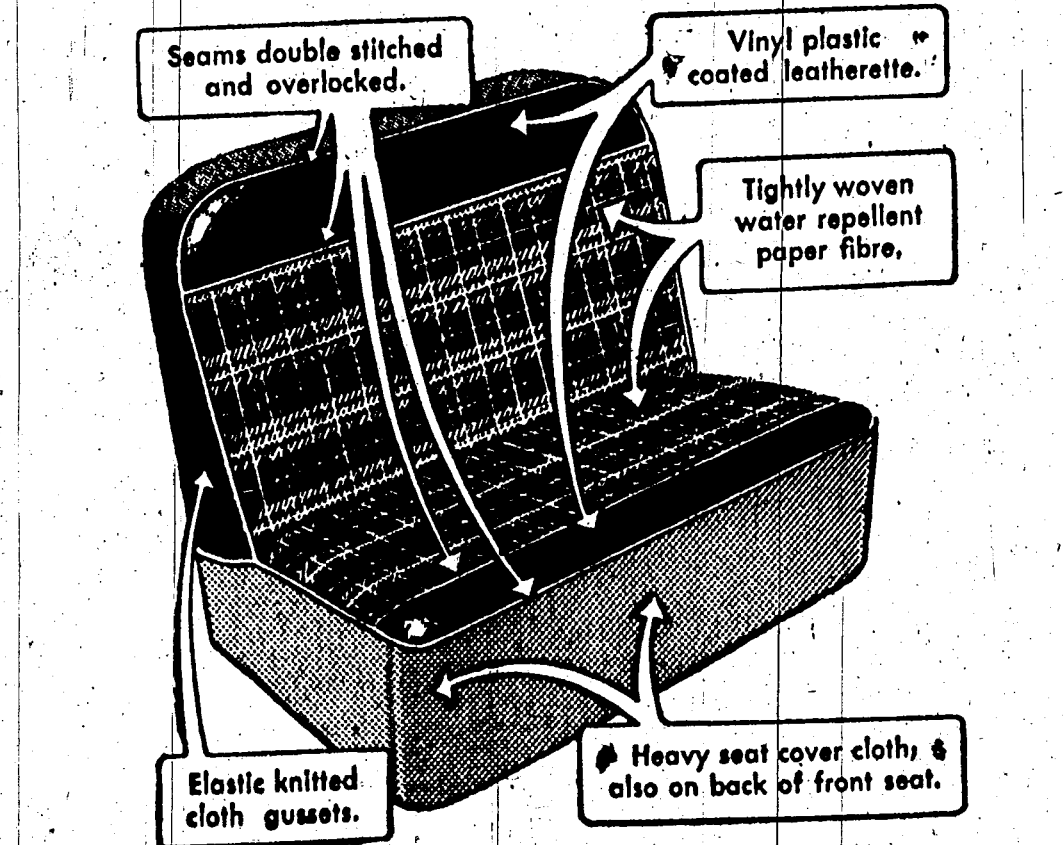
